**“A Little Bit of Toothpaste is Always Left in the Tube: a Conversation with Shabaka WaQlimi**

Several of you have asked me to follow up on an excellent sermon about the death penalty by Pam Gehrke, who served as our Intern Minister in 2008-2009. Thanks to the work of Karen Lerner, on October 4, I will have a conversation with a man who spent thirteen years, 1974 to 1987, on Death Row for a crime he did not commit. Shabaka writes, “No matter how old or wrinkled the toothpaste tube becomes, if you squeeze it just right, something will come out every time. That is all you needed, just that much, to survive each day.

**We will be splitting the Offertory on Sunday with Witness to Innocence, a national anti-death penalty organization that arranges speaking events for individuals who were wrongly accused, sent to death row, and now have been exonerated and**

released. The organization is composed of these ex-death row prisoners, and also facilitates gatherings for its members to empower them to be effective leaders in the movement to abolish the death penalty.

**10:10 a.m. Forum:** *Where Can You Get a Good Drink Around Here?* with Jim Neustadt, Director of Communications and Community Relations, Washington Suburban Sanitary Commission (WSSC). Learn the challenges the WSSC faces to provide us with good, drinkable water—and what WSSC is going to do about them. Water rates are up 9%; is that the answer?

### **Music Notes:**

The Call to Worship includes two extremely different genres of vocal music that have been set by contemporary composer Paul Halley, who performed with the Paul Winter Consort and was also Organist and Choirmaster at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City from 1977-1989. The *Kyrie* is one of the most venerable settings of the Latin Mass. Halley has utilized the plainsong form, but with an assortment of even and odd meters which give the line a charming unpredictability. *Haleluya! Pelo tsa rona* is a joyous setting of a South African song; “Hallelujah! We sing your praise, all our hearts are filled with gladness.”

*Meditation on Breathing* is an original song from “Singing the Journey” by Sarah Dan Jones, a composer whom some have had the pleasure of meeting at the General Assembly gatherings. The chant-like character of the song, with tenors and basses intoning the phrase “Breathe in, breathe out,” creates an aura of tranquility, allowing us to bring peace and calm into our being.

*Even When God is Silent* was composed by Michael Horvit to commemorate the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of *Kristalnacht, The Night of Broken Glass*, in November of 1988. The text of the song comes from a poem that was written on a basement wall in Cologne, Germany and discovered by Allied troops. The poem had been written by someone hiding from the Gestapo. The composer writes: “It is one of the most poignant poems I know: an extraordinary testament of faith under horrible circumstances.”

Thomas Guthrie’s postlude music comes from William Walton’s film score to the movie “Richard III,” which premiered in 1955.

## From the Ministers

### ***Roger Fritts***

One of Cedar Lane's members, **Peter Fenn**, was **Rev. Forrest Church's** oldest friend. I asked Peter to write a few words for our newsletter:

“Forrest Church's death leaves a hole in our hearts and takes away a leading voice in Unitarian Universalism. Forrest, of course, grew up here, and in Idaho, where his father was a U.S. Senator for 24 years. Forrest and I were best friends for 46 years, ever since 9<sup>th</sup> grade at Walt Whitman High School. He joked that I went into his family's business, politics, and he went into mine, Unitarianism, with both my grandfather and great-grandfather as Unitarian ministers.

“Forrest always had a tremendous intellect and tremendous passion for history, music, literature and sports. He became a true church scholar but more important, could translate the hopes and fears of everyday life into language and insights that all could understand. In his 30 years at All Souls in New York he became a ‘down to earth’ minister and in his book, *Love and Death*, took the fundamental tenets of his battle with cancer and confronting his own death and brought them home in a kind and comforting

way. Forrest's life was a testament to what it means to be a Unitarian, dealing with our strengths as well as our flaws, and knowing that as JFK said, "here on earth God's work must truly be our own."

**"Association Sunday: Standing on the Side of Love"** *Rev. Roger Fritts*  
Association Sunday is one day each year when congregations across the country recognize the work of the Unitarian Universalist Association. The sermon will tell the roots behind the UUA's public advocacy campaign "Standing on the Side of Love."

**Forum:** *Rethinking the War on Drugs* with Charles Thomas, Co-Founder and President of The Interfaith Drug Policy Initiative. Albert Einstein famously said that “God would not play dice with the universe.” In this particular case, he relied on faith, and it turned out (probably) that he was wrong. Drawing on research for his best-selling biography, “Einstein: His Life and Universe,” Walter Isaacson will discuss Einstein’s fruitless search for a spirituality and intellectually satisfying “theory of everything.”

**“Countdown to Copenhagen”**

The United Nations Climate Change Conference in Copenhagen will open on December 7. Secretary General Ban Ki-moon has said, “Failure to reach broad agreement in Copenhagen would be morally inexcusable. The sermon will look at what is at stake.

**Forum:** *China: The People’s Republic Turns Sixty*, with Harry Harding, Dean of the Frank Batten School of Leadership and Public Policy, and Professor of Politics and Public Policy, at the University of Virginia. October 1 is the 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the founding of the People’s Republic of China. Dr. Harding will review the major trends in China’s evolution over those six decades, as the country has experienced an often dizzying blend of domestic upheaval, dramatic change in development models, rapid economic growth, and ultimate rise to major power status. Americans face a very different China now than they did sixty years ago, or even twenty years ago. How must our approach to China change to match the dramatic transformation of China itself?

Earlier this year, Dr. Harding served as a visiting professor at the University of Hong Kong, and from 1995 to 2005 he was Dean of the Elliott School of International Affairs at George Washington University.

On Sunday, October 11, 2009, Equality Across America ([www.equalityacrossamerica.org](http://www.equalityacrossamerica.org)) is sponsoring a National Equality March in Washington, DC. People from all across America will gather with the goal of achieving full equality for all LGBT people in all matters governed by civil law in all 50 states. The UUA has officially endorsed the March, and UUA President Rev. Peter Morales will lead the UU delegation at the Rally.
