I recently found out I was “elderly”. I’m definitely aging, but “elderly?” My 40 something GP shared her concerns for me as one of her “elderly” patients. All the negative stereotypes (unproductive, failing, and mentally declining) raced through my mind) Why was the word “elderly” such a problem for me? After some reading, I realized that Ageism is alive and thriving in our culture. It is supported by the language we all use daily. Negative messages on aging proliferate on TV, in film, on social media and in advertising. Negative stereotypes about aging affect those still in the workplace, but also how policy about all of us is decided. Without intending to, I have been complicit in maintaining some of the stereotypes that denigrate older people. I’ve laughed at all the “senior moment” jokes and told friends they were amazing for their age. Words matter, and having positive feelings about aging, or the “**normal process of living,**” matters. Seniors Ride Ride-On for Free!

Seniors (age 65+ years), there is a SmarTrip card that may be used to: ride Metrorail at senior fares, **ride free** on Ride-On buses and some Metrobuses in Montgomery County **Monday—Friday, 9:30 AM to 3 PM, Saturday, 8:30 AM to 4 PM** or to ride for **half fare all other times**. The Senior SmarTrip card costs \$2 (no value on the card at the time of purchase). Present the Senior SmarTrip Card to Ride On and Metrobus operators in Montgomery County for free or half fare (see hours above) on most routes. **During free times, do not tap** the Senior SmarTrip card on the target on the fare box because it will deduct a fare! **Show the card** to the bus operator and make sure there is value on it during half-fare hours. If you don't have the SmarTrip card, a Medicare Card along with a photo ID will work, too. **To get a Senior SmarTrip card**, visit any Montgomery County library, the Silver Spring TRiPS Store, the Mobile Commuter Store, or the Montgomery County Treasury Office. Bring proof of age (state ID, birth certificate, or passport). After completing a registration form, you will buy the Senior SmarTrip card and get information about it. For more information, call the MC311 Information Center (dial 311 from inside the County or 240-777-0311 if outside MoCo).
